AAUW advances equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, and research.

AAUW, including opening membership to people who share our concerns for women and girls but who do not have college degrees. The proposal to broaden membership eligibility will be voted on at the national convention in St. Louis in June. The proposed new bylaws state, "Any individual or institution who supports the purpose and mission of AAUW may become a member of AAUW" (Article IV, Section 2a). The stated rationale for dropping the degree requirement is "Because AAUW focuses its mission on advancing equity, membership open to all who support the mission follows from that principle. Open membership provides an equal opportunity for all to join, but the unique mission and grassroots strength of AAUW do not change. As a cause-based organization, the effectiveness of AAUW relates to the commitment and passion of its members, not to any qualifications the members may have. One does not need educational credentials to work for women's education." Since I will be serving as a state delegate at the national convention, I have been thinking about the proposed bylaw changes, especially the change in membership requirements.

Right now (and at the risk of appearing elitist), I am against dropping the college degree as a membership requirement. Our common experiences as college women and men build unique bonds among AAUW members that run across gender, race, and class differences, and these bonds distinguish us from other organization promoting equity for women, such as NOW. I don't want AAUW to lose its uniqueness. I also wonder if the drop in AAUW membership in recent years is the real reason prompting the proposal for change. If so, instead of dropping the college degree, we should better promote AAUW membership among college students and extend student affiliate membership to graduate students. When women make up more than 50% of the college student population, we have a large pool to draw from, and I am not convinced we have done our best to reach these students as potential life-long AAUW members.

I say that my opinion on the question of membership requirements is my view "right now"—meaning it is subject to change. I would like to hear your opinions on dropping the college degree for AAUW membership requirements. Please email me at acantrell@comcast.net and let me know what YOU THINK. Under research, the EF designs and supports national research projects regarding the issue of gender equity. The Foundation writes, publishes, and disseminates research reports on gender equity. The EF also supports a University Scholar-in-Residence each year to conduct gender equity research. One of the fundraising activities conducted by the Murfreesboro Branch of AAUW is the annual Buffalo Auction held at the December meeting when members donate items and then purchase tickets for the opportunity to win items. Taking Applications for Ruth Houston Memorial Scholarship. The Murfreesboro Branch of the American Association of University Women is taking applications for the Ruth Houston Memorial Scholarship. Our branch will award a \$1,000 scholarship each semester—Fall 2009 and Spring 2010—to the MTSU undergraduate student who best demonstrates academic promise and financial need. To be eligible for consideration, applicants must have successfully completed their freshman year at MTSU. Returning adult students, in particular, are encouraged to apply. The scholarship is renewable each semester as long as full-time status and a 2.5 GPA are maintained. **The**

deadline for applications is March 15, 2009, with an anticipated announcement of the recipient at our April meeting. Please encourage interested and qualified candidates to apply. Applicants must submit one original and two copies of the following to Dr. Tanya M. Peres, Chair, Ruth Houston Scholarship Committee, MTSU P.O. Box 10:

- 1. Name, address, telephone number, email address
- 2. Copy of college transcript(s)
- 3. Two letters of reference from referees acquainted with applicant's academic or professional work
- 4. An essay of no more than 1,000 words describing (1) the applicant's professional goals and the manner in which the scholarship will contribute to the applicant's success and (2) the applicant's financial need. The essay should be type-written or computer-generated.
