2011-2012 Ruth Houston Memorial Scholar. Ruth Houston Scholarship Selection Committee Chair Tanya Peres (pictured left) congratulates the 2011-2012 scholarship recipient Virginia "Ginny" Lucas. As an undergraduate student. Ginny paid her own way to attend the annual meeting of the American Academy of Forensic Sciences in New Orleans and continues to present research at local and regional meetings. She is engaged in zooarchaeology leading to an anthropology senior thesis and has been awarded a URECA grant for a related zooarchaeological research project. Just recently, she was invited to be a member of the Forensic Anthropology Search and Recovery Team (FASR). Ginny works faithfully with campus volunteer organizations, including the undergraduate anthropology club (MTAS) and has volunteered to assist in a major project assessing and mitigating flood damage to archaeological sites along the Cumberland River in the wake of the May 2010 floods. Her professors recognize her for her commitment to academic achievement in spite of the tremendous family responsibilities she has shouldered. Ginny has been the primary caregiver of her grandmother who is in the advanced stages of Alzheimer's while taking a full course load of 18 hours and working part-time. Ultimately, Ginny aspires to earn a PhD, work

for the federal government as an archaeologist, and then teach at a university as a zooarchaeologist in order that she may pursue her own research interests. The Ruth Houston Memorial Scholarship fund is helping Ginny to fulfill the first step towards completing her education and realizing her career goals. She will graduate from MTSU in May 2012.

**2011 NCCWSL Scholar.** Murfreesboro Branch nominee Lisa Walker (*pictured left*) was selected to receive the AAUW of Tennessee NCCWSL Scholarship to attend the 2011 National Conference for College Women Student Leaders held June 2-4, 2011, at the University of Maryland, College Park.
